"So the anger of the LORD was kindled against Israel" (2:20). The book of *Judges* takes us on quite the roller coaster ride, but there are lots of really important lessons we should learn. Let's talk about it...

For Class & Family Discussion:

- Let's revisit God's warning about the unbelieving people around the Israelites in Judges 2:3. What goes through your mind as you hear that warning? What was God saying?
- Let's read 2:10 again together. "And there arose another generation after them who did not know the LORD or the work that he had done for Israel." How would you rephrase that sentence in your own words? What was the big problem here?
- Our lesson offered five clues found in Judges 2 as to how Israel got so off track so quickly. Let's dig a little deeper into these five clues. What can we learn? Are these still a problem? If so, how can we avoid the danger? How do people fall into the same traps today? What happens when they do? How can we do better?
 - They didn't form their own relationship with God.

 - They didn't follow the good examples of faith that had come before them.
 - They stopped listening to God's instructions and warnings.
 - Even when life was hard because of their choices, they refused to repent.
- We'll see a cycle over and over again in Judges. Maybe drawing it below will help us prepare for our study and help us spot the cycle when we start going around and around, over and over again. Let's put these five words in a circle: STUBBORNNESS, PUNISHMENT, CRYING, JUDGE, SALVATION. What can we learn from that cycle that will repeat itself over and over again throughout Judges?
