After the four Gospels that begin the New Testament, The Acts of the Apostles begins like this:


In the <u>first</u> book, O Theophilus, I have dealt with all that Jesus began to <u>do</u> and <u>teach</u>, until the day when he was taken up, after he had given commands through the Holy Spirit to the apostles whom he had chosen. He presented himself <u>alive</u> to them after his suffering by many proofs, appearing to them during <u>forty</u> days and speaking about the <u>kingdom</u> of God.

(1:1-3)

Something was going to happen in Jerusalem. Jesus ordered the apostles not to leave. Listen carefully to what Jesus said to them in Acts 1:8:

"But you will receive <u>power</u> when the Holy Spirit has come upon you, and you will be my <u>witnesses</u> in Jerusalem and in all Judea and Samaria, and to the end of the earth."

Something was going to *start* in Jerusalem, but it wouldn't end there. Everyone everywhere needed to hear about what Jesus had done and taught. Everyone everywhere needed to hear that Jesus had died for the sins of the



world, that Jesus was alive, and that Jesus is going to come again. Just listen to what happened next in Acts 1:9-11:

And when he had said these things, as they were looking on, he was lifted <u>up</u>, and a cloud took him out of their sight. And while they were gazing into heaven as he went, behold, two men stood by them in white robes, and said, "Men of Galilee, why do you stand looking into <u>heaven</u>? This Jesus, who was taken up from you into heaven, will <u>come</u> in the same way as you saw him go into heaven."

The Old Testament contains one giant message: Jesus is coming. The four Gospels at the beginning of the New Testament announce: Jesus is here. From the beginning of *The Acts of the Apostles*, we're told how this greatest story of all is going to end: Jesus is coming again. That's a message everyone everywhere needs to hear and the news started to spread from Jerusalem. Let's talk about it...

	Tet's start with Acts 1:1. Who is writing this book? What is "the first book" that they are talking about, and how are they trying to help this man named Theophilus by writing both of these books?
•	Luke tells us that Jesus appeared to the apostles "during forty days" and spent time "speaking about the kingdom of God" (1:3). What is this "kingdom of God," and why would Jesus spend so much time talking about it? What do you think the apostles had in mind when they asked about the kingdom in 1:6?
•	We'll spend a little more time talking about it in our next lesson, but according to Acts 1:5, who was going to come and help the apostles after Jesus had left?
•	"You will be my witnesses" (1:8). In your own words, what is a witness? What does a witness do? What did Jesus expect these apostles to do?
•	What do you think went through their minds when they heard Jesus talk about carrying the good news to Samaria (1:8)? But what does this teach us—from the very beginning of <i>Acts</i> —about the news these witnesses needed to spread?
•	In Acts 1:12-14, Luke describes the apostles gathering with the other disciples of Jesus in Jerusalem, and he tells us something very important in 1:14. Who do we need to notice is there, with the disciples? Why does this matter? What has changed their minds?
•	In Acts 1:15-26, Peter leads the disciples in the appointing of another apostle to take the place of who? What had happened? Notice again in verse 22—what was the mission? Who gets "numbered with the eleven apostles"?

· If Jesus really is coming again, how should that shape the way we live this week?
