- 2. Luke's two volumes (Luke/Acts) were written from a historical standpoint (Lk 1:1-4; Acts 1:1-3)
 - the humanity and compassion of Jesus are highlighted in the Gospel
 - Jesus is referred to as "Son of Man" 26x in Luke The genealogy of Jesus is traced to Adam

- Historical footnotes are sprinkled throughout Luke's writings Augustus (2:1); Tivberius (3:1); Quirinius (2:2); census (2:3); tetrarch (3:1)

- There are more _____ in Luke than the other gospels
 are the heroes of lessons in Luke
- Wealth and riches are major themes in Luke
