The Gospels give us long sections of the final week of Jesus' life on earth. The cross was the fulfillment of His mission. It was the lamb sacrificed. It was the price paid for redeeming us. The death of Jesus was

Picture One: the crucifiers (Lk 23:33-38)

Jesus had already experienced several painful moments leading up to cross

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Our Lord was on the cross for six hours (three hours of light and three hours of darkness—Mk 15:33) This is the first of seven sayings of Jesus from the cross

1. In a atmosphere of hateful words, Jesus chose grace

Was their 'not knowing what they were doing,' excusable?

What did they not know?

Were they forgiven right then (Jn 8:24; Heb 11:6)?

Picture Two: the penitent thief on the cross (Lk 23:39-43)

Initially, both criminals hurled abuse at Jesus (Mt 27:44; Mk 15:32). One had a change of heart. Why?

The penitent thief rebukes his fellow criminal. In doing this, what statement does he make about Jesus?

What Five things did this thief know:

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Grace is found in the promise: today you will be with me in paradise. Jesus knew.

What word did Peter use for this in Acts 2?
