Peace With God Through Jesus Lesson 4 November 3 Romans 5:1-6:11; Galatians 3:26-29

Therefore, since we have been justified by <u>faith</u>, we have <u>peace</u> with God <u>through</u> our Lord Jesus Christ. (Rom 5:1)

Why do we even need to be worried about having peace with God? Because his righteous wrath is revealed from heaven against all ungodliness and unrighteousness (1:18). We sin and fall short of his glory (3:23). The relationship we were created for is severed by our sins. But did you hear the news in Romans 5:1? Peace with God is available through our Lord Jesus Christ. Remember how Jesus was described in Romans 3:25:

...whom God put forward as a <u>propitiation</u> by his blood, to be received by faith.

Why would God do such a thing for sinners? **Romans 5:6-8** provides the answer:

For while we were still <u>weak</u>, at the right time Christ died for the ungodly. For one will scarcely die for a righteous person—though perhaps for a good person one would dare even to die—but God

shows his \underline{love} for us in that while we were still sinners, Christ died for \underline{us} .

And when Jesus served as that propitiation—that atoning sacrifice for our sins—what happened? What is made available to us?

Through him we have also obtained \underline{access} by \underline{faith} into this \underline{grace} in which we stand, and we rejoice in hope of the glory of God. (5:2)

We can have peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ! Now here's a critically important point that Paul wants to be crystal clear on: if Jesus is my Lord, what about sin? If God is willing to show me such amazing grace, does that me I can still do whatever I want, even if it's sinful? Listen carefully:

What shall we say then? Are we to continue in sin that grace may abound? By <u>no</u> means! How can we who <u>died</u> to sin still live in it? (6:1-2)

Okay, we can't keep living in sin, but all of this leads to a really important question: how can I die to sin? Paul has talked with us a lot about faith (1:17; 3:22, 25-28; 4:11-12; 5:1-2). Is there anything I need to do?

Do you not know that all of us who have been <u>baptized</u> into Christ Jesus were baptized into his death? We were <u>buried</u> therefore with him by baptism into death, in order that, just as Christ was raised from the dead by the glory of the Father, we too might walk in <u>newness</u> of life. (6:3-4)

It's the same message Paul preached to the churches in Galatia (Gal 3:26-29). Sin enslaves us, but redemption is available through the atoning sacrifice provided by God (Rom 6:5-6). In Christ Jesus, we

can die to sin and God can raise us to newness of life (6:11). Let's talk about it...

For Class & Family Discussion:

• "Peace with God" (5:1). In your own words, what is that? Why is it such a blessing?

- What disrupted our "peace with God"? According to Romans 5:6-10, what impact did that disruption have on us?
- But who has been provided as the answer to the enormous problem we've made? How would you rephrase Romans 5:2 in your own words?
- Let's read Romans 5:3-5 together. Why do you think Paul brings up "sufferings" at this point in his letter? Can something good actually come from "sufferings"? If so, what? How?
- In Romans 5:11, Paul uses the word "reconciliation." What does that word mean? How does it relate to what Jesus has done for us?
- Let's read Romans 5:12-14 together. What is Paul describing? And once again, who is the answer? How would you rephrase 5:20-21 in your own words?
- Why would anyone think they could do what Paul is warning us against in 6:1?
- Why do you think Paul responds as sharply as he does in 6:2?
- "So you also must consider yourselves dead to sin and alive to God in Christ Jesus" (6:11). What does this mean? Why is it important? What is it going to look like if I live the way this verse is calling me to live this week?
