

So you also must consider yourselves dead to <u>sin</u> and alive to <u>God</u> in Christ Jesus.

Let not sin therefore <u>reign</u> in your mortal body, to make you obey its passions. Do not present your <u>members</u> to sin as instruments for unrighteousness, but present yourselves to God as those who have been brought from death to life, and your members to God as instruments for righteousness. For sin will have no dominion over you, since you are not under law but under <u>grace</u>. (Rom 6:11-14)

What does it mean to be "not under law but under grace?" Paul has already taught us that "the righteousness of God has been manifested <u>apart</u> from the law, although the Law and the Prophets bear witness to it—the righteousness of God through <u>faith</u> in Jesus Christ for all who believe" (3:21-22). The reason we need to be justified (4:23-5:1) is we have sinned and broken God's law. Our only hope is Jesus, whom God put forward as a sacrifice to atone for our sins (3:23-25).

What then? Are we to sin because we are not under law but under grace? By <u>no</u> means! Do you not know that if you present yourselves to anyone as obedient slaves, you are <u>slaves</u> of the one whom you <u>obey</u>, either of sin, which leads to death, or of obedience, which leads to righteousness? But thanks be to God, that you who were once slaves of sin have become obedient from the heart to the standard of teaching to which you were committed, and, having been set <u>free</u> from sin, have become slaves of righteousness. (6:15-18)

In Romans 6:20-23, Paul encourages us to think carefully about the "fruit" we want to harvest from our lives. Do we want to bear fruit of which we will one day be ashamed, ending in death? Or do we want to bear the sort of fruit that leads to sanctification and its end, eternal life?

In Romans 7:1-6, Paul emphasizes that we belong to Christ in order that we may bear fruit for God. As disciples of Jesus, "we serve in the <u>new</u> way of the Spirit and not in the <u>old</u> way of the written code." So is the law "sin"? By no means. "The law is <u>holy</u>, and the commandment is holy and righteous and <u>good</u>" (7:12).

For we know that the law is spiritual, but I am of the flesh, <u>sold</u> under sin. For I do not understand my own actions. For I do not do what I want, but I do the very thing I hate. Now if I do what I do not want, I agree with the law, that it is good. So now it is no longer I who do it, but <u>sin</u> that dwells <u>within</u> me. (7:14-17)

Nothing good comes from sin. Sin wages war. Sin enslaves. Sin produces death. Just listen...

Wretched man that I am! Who will deliver me from this body of <u>death</u>? Thanks be to God through

Jesus Christ our Lord! So then, I myself serve the law of <u>God</u> with my mind, but with my flesh I serve
the law of sin. (7:24-25)

This is why we must die to sin and be raised to newness of life in Christ Jesus. Let's talk about it...

•	In your own words, what does it mean to "present your members to sin as instruments for unrighteousness" (Rom 6:13)? And to present "your members to God as instruments for righteousness"?
•	How would you rephrase or summarize the important question asked in 6:16?
•	According to 6:17-18, how can we move from being "slaves of sin" to "set free from sin" as "slaves of righteousness"? How does this relate to the bookends of <i>Romans</i> that we've noticed over and over again (1:5; 16:26)?
·	Paul mentions "sanctification" in 6:19 and 6:22. What is "sanctification"?
•	Let's read Romans 6:20-23 together. How would you summarize what Paul is communicating in your own words?
•	Why does Paul bring up marriage in Romans 7:1-3? What is his point?
•	In 7:4, Paul emphasizes that Christians "belong" to Jesus. What does that mean? What does that look like in everyday terms? If I belong to Jesus
۲	Romans 7:7-25 can be challenging when we first read through it. Let's take our time with this section. How does it relate to what we've been learning and discussing?
