For Class & Family Discussion:

- 1. Let's think about these first two topics of Jesus' sermon: character and influence. In your own words, what is character? And influence? How are they connected? How does a person's character impact their influence?
- 2. "You are..." (Matt 5:13). Let's remind ourselves: who is the "you" Jesus is talking to?
- 3. Let's think about **salt**.
 - Of all the illustrations Jesus could use, why salt? What is salt "good" for? What sort of impact does it have on its surroundings?
 - If salt "loses its taste"... what then? Is Jesus really talking about salt, or something else? How can disciples of Jesus "lose their taste"?
- 4. Let's think about light.
 - Of all the illustrations Jesus could use, why light? When he describes his disciples as "the light of the world," what does he have in mind?
 - In your own words, what does it look like in everyday life to "let your light shine before others"? And what should the goal of a shining disciple always be according to 5:16? Is it sometimes easy to lose sight of that goal? Is there anything we can do to help ourselves remember that goal?
- 5. Character and influence; salt and light. What do we need to keep in mind this week in order to glorify our Father who is in heaven?
